

OH COUSIN, WHERE ART THOU?



Growing up, my concept of kin folks was limited to those who ate dinner at grandma's house on Sunday. Well... that is not exactly true as these were my cousins on my mother's side of the family. I had some Dedmon cousins, but we did not visit each other very often. I attribute most of that to the fact that dad was "raised" by his aunt, "Toni" Walker Cline. We did visit Ed and Bonnie Cline as he was dad's cousin, but dad thought of him more like a brother. We also visited with Gene and Rachel Callahan, as she was dad's aunt. My father's mother died when he was a baby and grandaddy remarried. His new wife had some children of her own and she was not able to take care of dad.

My 1st cousins with the surname Dedmon were limited to the children of dad's three brothers, James, Paul and Woodrow. Uncle James only had one child, Herbert. He was ten years older than I and I never really knew him very well. He married when I was ten and I don't recall ever seeing him after that. He and Doris had eight children and I have met a couple of them. Doris came to one of the family reunions with Connie and I think one or two other daughters. I have corresponded with others and one of his sons, Jay, lives 30 miles from me and my intentions are to visit him. The sad thing is Herbert was living 15 miles from me at Villa Rica, GA when he passed away in 1987 and I did not know about it until I saw his obituary a couple of years later.

Uncle Paul's only son, Jesse, passed away in 2006. He was a little over a year older than I and we did visit some. At one point we were at the same school. After high school, I married and moved away and he entered the service. We saw each other a few times after that. Uncle Woodrow had three children. Gene, Junior and Marvin. I played softball on opposite teames with Gene. He was an excellent player. Also, the summer after high school, I worked with Grant-Patten Milk Company, servicing vending machines and he worked at one of the locations on my route. For some reason, I was never around Junior very much. Marin and I are close in age, but I have not seen him in recent years. He is the only first cousin with the surname Dedmon who is living. As far as I know all of my dad's siblings and their spouses are deceased, except my aunt Ruth, who is actually my dad's half sister. She was married to James A.Boyd.

I had/have other cousins on dad's side of the family as he had 3 sisters. Aunt Edna married Robert Capehart and they had two girls, Barbara Jean and Betty Jo. Barbara died in 1943 at the age of 9. I think my memory of her is just through pictures and family discussion. Betty married Robert Helton and they had four children. I was never around Betty very much and although I have met her children, I don't really know them. Aunt Edna and Uncle Robert took a young man in and reared him as a son. I think he was from within their family somehow. Inever knew David very well as he was a lot younger than I. He married Elaine Clare Taylor and they have two children.

Dad had two half sisters, Pauline and Ruth. I never really knew Pauline, but I did correspond quite a bit with one of her sons a few years ago, but have lost touch with him. Aunt Ruth married James A. Boyd and they had 3 Children, Joel, Tanis and Debra. I knew them when they were very young, but as I moved away from the area in 1959 and did not return for almost 50 years, I do not know them very well. Joel was good to bring his mom to visit my mother during the last few years of her life and I have corresponded quite a bit with Debra. She lost her husband, William Donovan last year. They were living in Florida, but she has since moved back to Georgia. Although I know Tanis, but not very well, I have corresponded quite a bit with her daughter, Carrie. Debra has promised to bring aunt Ruth to visit, so I am looking forward to that as she is the only aunt I have left on dad's side of the family. I have two aunts living on mom's side.



KORY DEDMON MEMORIALIZED IN NAMING OF AGRI STUDENT LOUNGE February 14, 2014

Kory Dedmon Student Lounge Ceremony Kory Jacob Dedmon was remembered at Southern Arkansas University Thursday, February 13, 2014, in a ceremony to name the student lounge at SAU's Agriculture Center in his honor. Dedmon's life was cut short in an automobile accident on December 26, 2007 just a semester before he was scheduled to graduate with a degree in Agriculture Education. His former classmates and friends at SAU had the idea to raise money to keep his memory alive in SAU's new Agriculture Center.

"It's amazing that we all raised \$10,000 in less than a year to name this room after Kory," said Justin Morris to Dedmon's family and friends who filled the student lounge for the ceremony. "We just did a piece of what Kory would have done for any of us, and we just had the idea. This all came together and happened because of all of ya'll who loved Kory."

Morris said that now the group has met their goal of naming of the lounge, they are going to focus their efforts on a scholarship endowment in honor of their fallen friend. To continue the fundraising efforts, Morris announced plans for the 2nd Annual Swingin' for Kory two-person scramble golf tournament. It is scheduled for May 31, 2014, at Waldron Country Club with an 8 a.m. shotgun start. Entry is \$50 per team or \$25 per individual, and sponsorship opportunities are also available. At SAU, Dedmon was known to give the best campus tours, or "turrs" as he called them, as a part of his duties as a President's Ambassador. Shelly Whaley, assistant dean of advising and transfer recruitment, shared stories of Dedmon's meaningful time on campus. "When Kory walked into a room, he shined. When current and future students step into this room, I hope they will feel his spirit and know what it was like to be Kory Dedmon," said Whaley. A large photo of Dedmon is being placed in the student lounge, along with a plaque and several candid photos of him that show his positive attitude and bright smile. Dedmon was a 2004 graduate of Waldron High School where he was active in FFA and 4-H. It was there his passion for agricultural issues and education developed.

During his tenure at SAU, Dedmon spent a great deal of his time helping to educate students about the importance of agriculture. He was the recipient of the 2006-07 Mulerider Leadership Award. In addition to being an SAU President's Ambassador, he was a Collegiate Agriculture Ambassador for the National FFA Foundation and a member of Alpha Gamma Rho. He was recognized in Who's Who among College Students as well as State and Regional Boys Club Representative.

"I was lucky to have taught Kory in a few classes and we will never forget him," said Professor of Agriculture Economics Dr. Pierre Boumtje. "It's too painful that death takes people like Kory too early, but it is really special that his memory will live on here on campus because of his friends, alumni and family. Today is a great day!" Funds raised for the Agriculture Center, including those raised in Dedmon's honor, are being used to purchase of state-of-the-art equipment for the laboratories and classrooms in SAU's Agriculture Center. This investment will continue Dedmon's heartfelt passion of promoting and improving agriculture education for years to come.

I posted Kory and his grandmother's obituary in Volume 70. It was my understanding at the time they were together in a car accident that took both their lives. His grandmother was Gladys Yvonne "Von" James. She was his mother's mom. Kory descends from William and Margaret Daniels Dedmon, the son of Mark Richard Dedmon, the Revolutionary War Veteran and the first on record to spell his surname Dedmon.

HOOSIERS PUT DEDMOND TO GOOD USE John Decker (08/11/2008)

Bloomington – One couldn't fault Max Dedmond for having his doubts a couple of years ago. Hoosier tight ends have caught a combined five passes in the last two seasons, but that's all going to change this season with the arrival of talented redshirt freshman Max Dedmond... When IU was recruiting the talented tight end from Evansville Central H.S. in 2006, the staff talked about utilizing his playmaking skills in the Hoosiers' wide open aerial attack. Dedmond liked what he heard, but what he witnessed on the field was something entirely different. After Dedmond verbally committed to the Hoosiers before the start of the 2006 season, IU's tight ends were a non-factor in the passing game that fall, failing to catch a single pass. There was a modest increase in production during Dedmond's redshirt campaign in 2007, but the combined five catches by tight ends Nick Sexton and Troy Wagner was still nothing close to the sort of contribution Dedmond thought he could make.



For a player who had visions of being on the field regularly and being an integral part of the passing game, Dedmond couldn't help but be a bit uneasy about just how much he'd be used. "It was a little concerning when I first started, but they told me they'd get me involved and I trusted them," Dedmond said. "They said I'd be able to get on the field and catch some balls." Dedmond's faith has been rewarded. Indiana has added some new wrinkles to the offense specifically for Dedmond, allowing him to split out and work out of the slot and make plays downfield. He's been a primary target of both Ben Chappell and Kellen Lewis during 7-on-7 and 11-on-11 drills, and it's obvi ous he has a chance to be one of the team's primary pass catching targets.

While junior Troy Wagner figures to be the Hoosiers' hand-on-the-ground blocking tight end, Max Dedmond will be the tight end of choice in passing situations. He possesses the type of speed, athleticism and ball skills that IU hasn't had at the position in years, and those skills figure to be put to good use. "Max adds a lot to the offense," said IU Offensive Coordinator Matt Canada. "He's a

big, physical guy who can run good routes, catch the ball, and he's big enough to block for us when we need that. He adds something to the offense."

Dedmond has been polishing up on his route running and pass catching during fall camp, where he splits his time working with the wide receivers and tight ends. be able to benefit from the attention that other players figure to attract. "I'm really excited about this year," Dedmond said. "There are so many good receivers, the defense start to forget about the tight end. It's a good offense and a good position to be in."

While tight ends coach Kyle Conner is the Hoosiers' tight ends coach, Dedmond can often be found working with wide receivers' coach Bill Lynch and the slot receivers during position drills. "I've been splitting it up as far as who I'm working with, and I have been working with my hand on the ground to stay in touch with the blocking," Dedmond said. "But passing game wise, route running wise, I've been with Billy Lynch to keep my routes in tact." Canada and the IU staff have clearly added some new elements to the Hoosiers' spread attack to best utilize Dedmond's skills. While Indiana will continue to use its three and four wide receiver sets, it's also going to make sure it's putting Dedmond's considerable skills to good use as well.

"That's our job as a staff - to put players in position to make plays," Canada said. "We feel Max can make plays, so we'll try to utilize him in that way." Dedmond welcomes the chance to do just that. He knows he'll be able work in with a talented group of receivers that's headlined by Andrew Means and Ray Fisher, and he figures that as a bit of an unknown, he'll

After serving as a quality control coach at the University of Wisconsin and graduate assistant at North Carolina State, Max Dedmond couldn't pass up the opportunity to return to Central High School as an assistant football coach and teacher. "It's the perfect opportunity," said Dedmond, who gained his graduate degree last May at NC State. "I will be an assistant coach and work with the offense, specifically with the tight ends, fullbacks and running backs." Dedmond graduated from Indiana University with a bachelor's degree in kinesiology and teacher preparation in May 2012. After graduation, he briefly served as a volunteer assistant in football and track at Central. Dedmond, 25, joined the Wisconsin staff after former IU offensive coordinator Matt Canada became the Badgers' offensive coordinator. Dedmond then moved on to N.C. State for the past year and a half. "I always stayed in touch with (Central football coach and athletic director) Andy Owen," Dedmond said. "Central means everything to me."

His father, Mike Dedmond, also served as a Bears assistant. "My dad coached there for a long time," Dedmond said. "I'm not saying I'm following in his footsteps, but growing up I was excited (to be around Central's program). My whole family lives in Evansville."

In addition, he will be much closer to his girlfriend, Sloane Donhoff, who lives in Louisville, Kentucky. She played college volleyball at the University of Michigan. Dedmond was team captain at IU his senior year and a four-time Academic All-Big Ten selection. In his career with the Hoosiers, he caught 36 passes for 304 yards and two touchdowns as a tight end.

Dedmond knows all about dedication. When Wisconsin won the Big Ten title in 2012, he often slept on a cot in an office at Camp Randall Stadium. "That's what it takes to be a part of a big-time program," Dedmond said.

He was asked if he might want to become Central's head football coach down the road if and when Owen decides to become the Bears' athletic director exclusively. "I don't know," Dedmond said. "I haven't even thought about that. I'm excited to be at Central, whether it's as a volunteer or an assistant coach. It's good to be back."

Max's great grandfather was a brother to Eppy Dedmon, who was known for his athelitic ability. I recently published an article about Trey Cunningham, who is about a third cousin to Max.


