DEOXYRIBONUCLEIC ACID

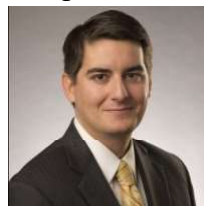
Huh??? There are times when I am very grateful for the dictionary, and this is one of those times. Deoxyribonucleic acid, is the hereditary material in humans and almost all other organisms, commonly referred to as DNA. Genealogical DNA testing is becoming a popular choice for those who are interested in their family histories, their ancestral make-up or their historic country of origin. My good friend and cousin, Tim Dedmon, is the administrator of the Debenham Project which can be found at <https://www.familytreedna.com/public/Debenham>,

The Debenham Surname DNA Project was started in January of 2010. All Debenhams and variant surnames are welcome to take part in this exciting project. Large groups of people with these surnames live in England, Wales, Australia, and the United States. Over time the spelling of the name surname Debenham has created many different variant surnames. Supposedly each of the variant family surnames are descendants of families that lived in the little Hamlet in Deben, England. We now know they do not all descend from Lucas de Debenham who lived in Debenham, England in 1165.

Thru Y-DNA testing we can now find our true family lineages, no matter how our last names are spelled. We now have twenty three members and fifteen different family lineages which are listed in the Goals section of the website. At this time we have four confirmed Family lineages that we know did not go back to Debenham, England, The Seneca Dedmon/Manley Line, The Norman Viking Dedmon/Tipton Line, The John Dedman Line and The Daniel Debnam Line. Thru Y-DNA testing it has now been confirmed that the Sapiston Line and the Redgrave line identified by Frank Debenham are one and the same and as a tribute to Frank Debenham we are calling this line the Frank Debenham line which he was a member of. Y-DNA is passed from Father to Son only from generation to generation without change, except for mutations. This technique allows us to identify which family lineages we are not related to as well as which ones we are related to. Only males with the Debenham or variant surnames may become members

of the project by taking a 37 marker Y-DNA test with FamilyTreeDNA. Each member will share their known father to son lineage in the News section of the website to help with the grouping of the families. We encourage females to become members of our project by having a male relative with the Debenham or variant surname take the 37 marker Y-DNA test with FamilyTreeDNA and join our Project together thru their test. Taking the Y-DNA test is very simple, you can view a video by doing a search on the internet: "*How To Take A Family Tree DNA Test - You Tube*". The Y-DNA test will preserve your family's Y-DNA sequence for future generations should all of the male's in your lineage dissappear. You may consider giving a financial gift to the general fund of the project to help with the cost of the 37 marker Y-DNA test for new members who would not otherwise join our project.

SOME THINGS DNA HAS TOLD US...

There have been several “mysteries” revealed to us through DNA testing. I have no reason to doubt the truth of it. For example, researchers for years looked for the father of Seneca Dedmon b. October 25, 1799 in Hall County, Georgia. This discovery was made on July 24, 2012. “We have confirmed thru Y-DNA testing and family information that Seneca Dedmon's father was Isaac Dennett Manley b. 1755 in Douglas, Goochland County, Virginia. The latest information I have received was that his mother was Mary Polly Deadman or Dedmon. As I reported in Volume 108 there are more than a dozen named Mary Polly Dedmon, or one of the varied spellings of the surname. Of course we can narrow the search by the dates. To my knowledge it has not been determined at this point which one is the mother of Seneca. It would appear that his mother was unmarried at the time of his birth, thus he has the surname Dedmon.

Another “Brick Wall” plaguing researchers for years was the father of Jonathan Dedmon/Dedman who married Susan Hunt. They married in North Carolina, but moved to Tennessee and is found in the Smith County death records. We know his descendants are found with the Surname; Dedmon, Dedman, Deadman and Deadmon. Many of them are still in the Middle Tennessee area. We also know they are scattered throughout the United States and maybe other countries.

It has been suggested for years that Jonathan may have been the son of Mark Dedmon by an earlier marriage or even an “out of wedlock” birth. It appears DNA testing has ruled out these possibilities. The prevailing theory at the present is that he was either an adopted or foster son of Mark. There does not appear to be a lot of proof for this as I have never seen his name associated with Mark and/or Hannah’s will and other documents. Maybe I have just missed seeing it. that be as it may, either Mark or someone must have given him the surname Dedmon and as far as I am concerned he is part of the Dedmon family. Of course this is just my opinion and I have no problem with anyone who may disagree. To say the least genealogical research is a very difficult thing and much hard to prove.

Even in my own line DNA testing has discovered there was an indiscretion and a premarital relationship. The child was born after the mother married a Dedmon, but was fathered by someone else. This has also happened in other branches of the family as I have been given the information. They still wear the Dedmon name.

Growing up there were “Step Cousins” and “Half Cousins” and cousins whose father was not actually their mother’s husband. However, we ignored all that and were just cousins.

Here is the way I explain those kind of situations: Let’s say that Bob goes over to his neighbor, Jim’s garden in the Spring and plants corn seed. That is all he does and leaves the work for Jim. So throughout the summer Jim, waters, ploughs and tends to the crop. **When it is time for the harvest, to whom does the corn belong?** You might think this is a bit of over simplification, but the point is, **“Anybody can plant seed”**, but it takes a lot of love and dedication to reap the harvest.

While I think it is interesting to see which group you may belong, but if you are a Dedmon or any of the varied spellings, WE ARE FAMILY. After all, if we go back far enough, we are all related anyway. DNA testing has been extremely helpful in sorting out those situations that had us baffled and we can stop looking for those people that we could not find. It also gives us new challenges as well, such as looking for Mary Polly Dedmon.

I remember how excited we were to discover that Tim, Jim and myself matched when the DNA results came back. All three of us descended from Mark and Hannah Dedmon through his son William. The three of us also matched David Alan Deadmon. Our common ancestor is Thomas Charles Deadman, the father of Mark Dedmon (the first known to spell D-E-D-M-O-N). He descends through Mark’s brother, Thomas Griffin Deadman/Dedmon. FindAgrave.com has him listed as Dedmon, buried in the Deadman Cemetery, Mocksville, NC. One can readily see the spelling of the surname does not necessarily indicate kinship. The descendants of Thomas Charles Deadman b. 1720 are actually and genetically from the Tipton Family Line. At this time we believe the descendants of Edmond Deadman, the brother of Thomas Charles came from Debenham, England.

Tim was very reluctant to share this information at first, not knowing how it would be received. However, as he said and I agree, “If it is true, we need to know”. He may have thought we would “Shoot the messenger”! That is not the case and we appreciate all the hard work and expense Tim has expounded. Even the Good Book says, *“The truth will make you free”*.

HISTORY OF NORTHERN MICHIGAN.

John P. Deadman, D. V. S. — There has been naught of temporizing or indirection in the career of this able and honored citizen of northern Michigan, who gained prestige as one of the leading representatives of the veterinary profession in the state, a vocation which has been followed successfully by his father and grandfather, as well as by six of his brothers, so that he has had no sinecure in maintaining the professional prestige of the name which he bears. He was born in London, province of Ontario, Canada, on the 26th of November, 1867, and is a son of William and Christina (McKay) Deadman, the former of whom was born in England and the latter in Scotland. Their marriage was solemnized in Ontario and the father passed the closing years of his life in Alpena, Michigan. In that city his widow still maintains her home. Of their ten children eight are still living, — Jacob I., who resides at Cobalt, Ontario; William P., who resides in Boyne City, Michigan; Angus, who is a resident of Marquette, Michigan; John P., who is the immediate subject of this sketch; and Emily, his twin sister, who is the wife of Eugene Johnson, deceased; Byron B., of Alpena, Michigan, to whom a sketch is dedicated on other pages of this work; Richard H., who is county clerk of Alpena county and who is mentioned elsewhere in this work; and Charles A., who resides at Madison, Wisconsin.

All of the brothers are veterinary surgeons except Richard H., and all are actively engaged in the practice of their profession. The grandfather, Dr. Jacob Deadman, was born in England and there passed his entire life, having been engaged in the practice of veterinary surgery from 1828 to 1864. Dr. William Deadman, father of John P. Deadman, learned the veterinary science in his native land under the able direction of his father, and when a young man he came to America and located in the province of Ontario, Canada, where he was engaged in the work of his profession until 1879. He then removed to Alpena, Michigan, where he continued to reside until his death. He was actively engaged in professional work for nearly fifty years. The sons organized and incorporated the Deadman Brothers Medical Company of Alpena and were associated therein in the manufacture of various veterinary remedies for a number of years.

Dr. John P. Deadman was reared to the age of twelve years in his native county in Ontario and there gained his early education in the public schools. He then accompanied his parents on their removal to Alpena, Michigan, where he continued to attend the public schools, and finally, after preliminary discipline under the direction of his father, he entered the veterinary department of the Detroit College of Medicine, in which he was graduated as a member of the class of 1895, and from which he received the degree of Doctor of Veterinary Surgery. Prior to this time he had been associated with his father in practice. He continued to reside at Alpena until the spring of 1895, when he took up his residence at Sault Ste. Marie, where he continued in the work of his profession until the autumn of 1909, when, on account of the ill health of his wife,

he removed to Portland, Oregon, in the hope that his loved companion might be restored to health. She was, however, summoned to the life eternal in May, 1910, and Dr. Deadman then returned to Sault Ste. Marie, where he has since continued in the work of his profession, in which he has long held precedence as one of the able and successful residents thereof. In politics he is aligned as a stalwart supporter of the cause of the Democratic party. He is a member of the Michigan State Veterinary Association and had the distinction of being a member of the first veterinary examining board in the state of Michigan, besides which he served for some time as United States Inspector of the port of Sault Ste. Marie. He served four years as treasurer of the city of Sault Ste. Marie and no citizen enjoys a lighter degree of popular confidence and esteem. He is affiliated with Red Cross Lodge, No. 51, Knights of Pythias; Sault Ste. Marie Chapter, No. 552; Benevolent & Protective Order of Elks; Sault Ste. Marie Lodge, No. 12:i. Independent Order of Odd Fellows; and also holds membership in the Knights of the Maccabees and Angola Society.

In September, 1893, Dr. Deadman was united in marriage to Miss Sophronia Eagle, who was born in the province of Ontario, Canada, and whose death occurred in the city of Portland, Oregon, in May, 1910, as already stated. Concerning the five children of this union the following brief record is given: Emily died in infancy, as did also Russell N. and Jennings "W.". these children being triplets. Webster "W." remains at the paternal home; as does also Helen Sophronia, who is five years of age at the time of this writing.

At the time of the Doctor's removal to Portland, Oregon, in 1909, as stated in a preceding paragraph, one of the Sault Ste. Marie papers entered an appreciative and facetious article concerning him and from this it is deemed but consonant to make the following quotations with but slight paraphrase, as the statements are well worthy of perpetuation instead of being buried in musty newspaper files : "Now that the Doctor is about to leave for the edge of the great American continent, it might be opportune to take advantage of the chance to say a few things about him before his face. There are probably but few men anywhere who constitute as good a theme for the talker or writer. There are probably but few men who have had such perilous and eventful careers. There is much of striking interest to be said about this unique personality.

"In the first place he is one of the prominent veterinary surgeons in the state and comes from what is presumably one of the oldest families of veterinaries in this country. His father and grandfather and six of his brothers are veterinary surgeons and there is only one black sheep in the family who failed to keep the pace set by the ancestors. A striking fact in regard to this remarkable man is that he fights the battle of life with but one leg and with but one sure-enough eye. Years ago the Doctor was a splendid specimen of physical manhood and ready for muscular stunts in competition with the strong boys, but one accident resulted in the loss of a leg and another took one eye and threatened to take two. However, one leg was not a handicap when the Doctor entered the political race, and in spite of the overwhelming normal Republican majority he was able to win easily for two terms. As a one-legged political sprinter the Doctor was certainly entitled to classification with fast company.

"Still more striking facts in regard to the Doctor are that he is a twin himself, was the father of triplets and his hunting mare some years ago gave birth to twin colts. It has also been said that the doctor was the owner of a two-headed calf and that his hens laid double-yolked eggs, but this is somewhat of an exaggeration. The Doctor has a two-headed calf in his office but it was not the child of one of his cows. The Doctor is also prominent as a hunter and fisherman. After he lost his leg and was not qualified for the tramp role, he gained distinction for successfully hunting for deer from the back of his faithful mare. He is familiar with the angling game and an ardent devotee of the sport."

Byron B. Deadman, D. V. S.

It is a rare thing to find in a single family so much talent along one line of endeavor as is displayed in the Deadman family. Three generations, paternal grandfather, father and six sons, have all achieved most distinctive success as veterinary surgeons. Concerning this distinguished family a more complete history appears elsewhere in this volume, in the sketch of the career of John F. Deadman, a brother of his whose name introduces this article, Dr. Byron Bruce Deadman. He was born at Clandeyboy, Middlesex County, province of Ontario, Canada, on the 7th of March, 1871. He is one of seven children born to Dr. William H. and Christina (McKay) Deadman, who removed to Michigan in 1881, establishing the family home in Alpena.

Dr. Byron B. Deadman was a child of ten years of age at the time of his advent in the "Wolverine state and after a good common-school education he began the study of veterinary surgery under the able preceptorship of his father. So rapid was his progress in this profession that he became a reliable assistant to his father when but sixteen years old. He has continued to be identified with this line of enterprise during the long intervening years and he is now recognized as an authority on all animal diseases. He is a valued and appreciative member of the Wolverine Veterinary Association and in a fraternal way he is affiliated with Alpena Lodge, No. 199, Free & Accepted Masons; and Alpena Lodge, No. 505, Benevolent & Protective Order of Elks, besides which he also holds membership in the Knights of the Maccabees. In politics he is aligned as a staunch supporter of the principles and policies for which the Republican party stands sponsor and though he has never manifested aught of ambition for public office of any description he contributes in generous measure to all enterprises projected for the good of the community. In 1906 Dr. Deadman and his two brothers, Dr. John F. Deadman, of Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan, and Richard H. Deadman, of Alpena, organized the Deadman Brothers Medical Company, at Alpena, the same being incorporated under the laws of the state with a capital stock of sixty thousand dollars. Its officers are as follows, — Dr. Deadman, of this sketch, president; Richard H. Deadman, secretary; and Dr. John F. Deadman, treasurer. The company has built up an extensive business and its admirable success is due in large measure to the fair and honorable methods employed by the Deadman brothers. They are men of extraordinary executive ability and are well deserving of their reputation for sterling integrity and unquestioned honesty.

On the 5th of May, 1894, was solemnized the marriage of Dr. Deadman to Irene Violet Hopkins, who was born in Tuscola county, Michigan, and is a daughter of Lorenzo and Lois Evelyn Winton Hopkins, both of whom were born and reared in Michigan. Mr. Hopkins is engaged in agricultural pursuits in Oscoda and Alcona counties and he is recognized as an essentially loyal and public spirited citizen. His political faith is that of the Republican party. Mrs. Deadman is the third in order of birth in a family of four children and she was reared and educated in her native county. Dr. and Mrs. Deadman became the parents of ten children, four of whom are living, namely, Violet, Lorenzo, and John and Lois, twins.

As I mentioned earlier, the article referred to Dr. Deadman as John P. but other very reliable sources list him as John F. and at least one source gives his middle name as Flanagan. He was married at least three times. His first wife was Sophronia A. Eagle. They married on September 19, 1893, and had five children. She died on May 19, 1910, at the age of 43. He then married Bertha Hubbert and they had one child. It appears his third wife was Zoe Mae Collins who is buried along side of him.

The one who did not was apparently a politician. Richard Hector Deadman was born in Clandeboye, Ontario, September 20, 1872. He served in the U.S. Army during the Spanish-American War. He was a member of Michigan state house of representatives from 1939-50. He was married to Lillie Rea and I have no record of children. He died in Alpena, Alpena County, Michigan, January 13, 1962 (age 89 years, 115 days). Interment at Evergreen Cemetery.

He was in the real estate business; and served public office as Alpena County Clerk, 1909-12; and Alpena County Treasurer, 1917-21; He was a member of Michigan state house of representatives from Alpena District, 1939-50, for the Republican Party. He was defeated in the primary in 1936, 1950, and 1954. He was an Episcopalian. of English and Scottish ancestry. Member, Odd Fellows; Grange; Elks. As was mentioned elsewhere in this newsletter he was the only son of William who did not follow the trade of Veterinary Surgery. He married Lillie Rea and there is no record of offspring. He died in Alpena, Alpena County, Mich., January 13, 1962 (age 89 years, 115 days). Interment at Evergreen Cemetery in Alpena County, MI.
