The total number of deaths in the United States in 2021 is reported to be 3,385,364. The worldwide number is listed as 69,090,119. COVID-19 was the third leading cause of death in the United States last year, and deaths from COVID-19 increased by 1% in 2021 over 2020, according to new data from the National Vital Statistics System released today by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

Only heart disease and cancer killed more Americans than COVID-19, with provisional death tolls from each cause totaling 693,000, 605,000, and 415,000, respectively. Those were also the three leading killers in 2020.

Approximately 60,000 more people died from COVID-19 in 2021 than the first year of the pandemic. In both years, the death rates from COVID-19 were highest in Americans ages 85 and older. In total the United States has confirmed 80,896,222 COVID-19 cases, including 990,939 deaths, since the start of the pandemic

One thing is for sure we will always have disease and death as long as this old world stands. Our bodies were not meant to live forever and mine is showing its mileage. I don't mean to be morbid, as I am just quoting the facts. I believe it was Joe Friday who coined that phrase.

FAMILY SPORTS NEWS

A&M TRACK AND FIELD WIN FOUR EVENTS AS BRYCE DEADMON RUNS WORLD-LEADING TIME

The Texas A&M men's and women's track and field teams brought home four event titles with Bryce Deadmon running a world-leading 400-meter time at the 93rd Clyde Littlefield Texas Relays in Austin.



The Aggies had 11 qualifying marks on the first two days of competition at Mike A. Myers Stadium and recorded a total of 11 top-five finishes. Winning two title events in track and one in field brought the event titles to four over the three-day competition after Carter Bajoit won the men's high jump Friday afternoon. James Smith II in 400-meter hurdles and Deborah Acquah setting a school record in "A" competition triple jump earned the other event titles over the weekend.

Bajoit won the men's "B" competition with a jump of 2.12m/6-11 1/2. Bajoit passed on the opening height of 1.97m/6-5.5 and went on to clear 2.02m/6-7.5 and 2.07m/6-9.5 on his first attempts, which proved to be crucial since it placed him in a tie for first with Micky Ferdinand of A&M-Commerce.

Deadmon won the men's 400-meter invitational with a personal best and No. 1 in the world time of 44.62. The race marked the first time in his career to run sub-45 seconds in the 400-meter and makes him the No. 3 best performer in program history, according to 12thman.com. Devin Dixon placed fourth in the race at 46.40.

This North Carolina Couple is Helping Preserve Their Town's Historic Charm

For the Millers, flipping a house is more than saving an old building. Restoring a historic home means ensuring that it lives on to see more families creating memories in the Millers' hometown of Concord, North Carolina. "I do feel like caregiver," Adam Miller says, reflecting on his experience working with old homes. "If you don't take care of it, then that could be the end of the home... and I want to be the guy that fixes it, so it lasts another 100 years." Adam and his wife Jessica have always lived in and been surrounded by historic homes. Now with their picture-perfect family of four little boys, the Millers are growing their own roots in the same town where they grew up and fell in love.

Concord, North Carolina is the location of many of the state's historic houses, and the Millers are hoping to restore some of the town's original charm. Their own stately white-columned house, built in 1906, was Jessica's childhood home. It's affectionately known as 'The Notebook House' by people in Concord because of its resemblance to the grand home in the movie-adaptation of Nicholas Sparks' *The Notebook*. Growing up, Jessica got used to frequent visits from people who shared stories about her home's past. Now that they've renovated the house and work on others in the area, people in their community often stop by to share stories and memories.

"That's the cool thing about sharing history with generations of people, Adam says. "I find it fascinating every time something is uncovered." Jessica hopes the community excitement will continue with the houses that she and Adam restore. They also share frequent updates on their restoration projects with over fifty thousand followers on Instagram and 1.6 million followers on TikTok. Despite both loving antique items and historic homes, Adam and Jessica never formally discussed flipping houses with each other before diving in.

"We fell in love with them," Adam says about old homes. The Miller's 1906 house is the fourth one that they've renovated together, and the place they plan on calling their forever home. Their current flip project is a 1,200-square-foot mill home, which they want to turn into a cozy cottage. "The fun thing with me and Adam is that we are actually both artists," Jessica says, "So where most people would do it [flip houses] for profit or a quick turnover, it's a creative outlet for us, so we really do like to lean into the process."

They've also dabbled in renovating commercial spaces like The Downtown Warehouse, which Jessica co-owns with her sister. The space, formerly an old hardware store in downtown Concord, is now a charming wedding and party venue. With every project they tackle, the Millers keep the historic character of a home in mind. "We like to mix in vintage and found objects, but our layouts have a traditional feel," Jessica says.



From driving hours to pick up Facebook Marketplace treasures to popping by The Depot at Gibson Mill, the Millers are always on the hunt for antique pieces with stories. They even have a personal "antique store" where they keep pieces they've collected over the years and plan to use as staging furniture for future flip homes. While they love every part of renovating a home, Adam and Jessica agree the real reward is knowing they're helping continue the memory of the space. "We get to be just a small little piece of that puzzle," Jessica says, "We're scooting it along to its future."

**Woman of 70
RECALLS EARLY SKAGWAY DAYS**
**Mrs. George R. Dedman
of Golden North Hotel
Knows Famous Men**

KETCHIKAN.-- Few women living or dead have crammed so much of life into a span of 70 years as has Mrs. George D(?) Dedman, owner of the Golden North hotel in Skagway, and one of Alaska's pioneers, who was in Ketchikan recently visiting at the home of Father Mark T. Carpenter, writes Kenneth Me Olaskey in the Ketchikan Chronicles. From the time that her husband was in real estate and banking business in Portland and had several hundred thousand dollars invested in various holdings, through the panic of '93' when that fortune was swept away to the stirring days of the gold rush in '98' when Skagway was a booming city of more than 15,000 persons, and even up to the present time when at the age of 70 she still manages a 60-room hotel and is active in women's clubs and civic affairs, there have been few dull moments in her eventful life.

***** Landed With 60 Cents *****

"My husband landed in Skagway in February 1898, with only 60 cents in his pocket and a grub stake. I followed him ,arriving July 5, of the same year." she said in relating her story. "Having lost our fortune during the panic and being nearly penniless, George started a laundry business and I went to work at the old Pacific hotel." Later on, in 1899 ,they bought a part interest in the old Golden North hotel and here entertained many of the northlands colorful characters.

Skagway in those days, being a port of entry, sprang up over night a sprawling and brawling tent city when that magic word "gold" was shouted to the 4 corners of earth. In answer to that call came thousands upon thousands of fortune hunters, miners from California, the Couer d' Alenes, Australia, and riff raff from the slums of the world, eager to get the gold or prey upon those who did get it. Most of them passed through Skagway for the interior, or else settled there to swell her population.

***** Eleven Married Men *****

"When I arrived," Mrs. Dedman said "there were only eleven married women, 350 professional women and more than 10,000 men in the city. The daytime was given over to hard, grinding toil, and the nights naturally enough to wine, women of song. The life was a hard one and those who braved it suffered many hardships. Anybody who got gold in the north certainly earned it.

"But before I go any farther I must tell my bathtub story," and here she chuckled reminiscently. "There was no bathtub in the city, and one day the thought occurred to me that a bathtub should be a paying proposition, so I proposed to my employer, the owner of the Pacific hotel, that we install one. He agreed to furnish the water and wash the tub if I would furnish the tub and towels, and we were to go 50-50 on the proceeds."

***** 50 Cents For Bath *****

"We charged 50 cents a bath and the first month my share of the profits amounted to \$157. For four months this kept up and the profits never went below \$150 a month, but soon competitors entered the field and cut the price to 25 cents. However, I still believe that cleanliness is next to Godliness. There are 27 bathtubs in my hotel at the present time."

"Many people think that the novels written by Jack London, Rex Beach and others, and the poetry of Robert Service are all gross exaggerations. Such is not the case. None of them are to overdrawn. Many of the characters living in the pages of their books were really flesh and blood characters, and many of them stayed at our hotel. For instance, the original Cherry Malott, who is the chief woman character in one of Rex Beach's novels, often stopped at the Golden North, as did the girl with the belt made of \$20 gold pieces from one of Service's poems." Mrs. Dedman knew Jack London from the time he was 17 years of age. His real name was not London, but John Cheney. She also knew Beach and Service.

Mrs. Dedman tells of seeing more than \$3,000.000 worth of gold dust piled in the street in front of the Masonic Hall. According to her story, the dust was in five- gallon cans which were bound with copper bands. Many of the miners would leave their pokes of dust with her when they went on a drunk and would come back from time to time for fixed amounts which they had agreed upon before. One fellow blew his entire stake of \$6,000 in three days.

***** Soapy Smith Days *****

Soapy Smith was killed a few days after I arrived in Skagway and 40 of his band of desperadoes were blue ticketed out of the city with threats of death if they ever returned. They were deported by the citizens after committing many lawless acts.

"Speaking of Soapy Smith reminds me of an incident that occurred at the hotel a summer or two ago. A middle-aged man who had been stopping at the hotel a day or two came up to me just as he was leaving and said, "Mrs. Dedman, I'll bet you don't know who I am." I told him that I did not recognize him, whereupon he said that he was one of the 40 of Soapy Smith's gang who was presented with the blue ticket on that memorable occasion. This was the first time he had been back and even then he had a heavy beard.

During all the years that have passed since the days of '98, Mrs. Dedman has remained in Skagway in the hotel business. She has seen the city dwindle from 15,000 people that it had at the height of its glory to its present population of only 350, but her faith in the future of Alaska is undimmed.

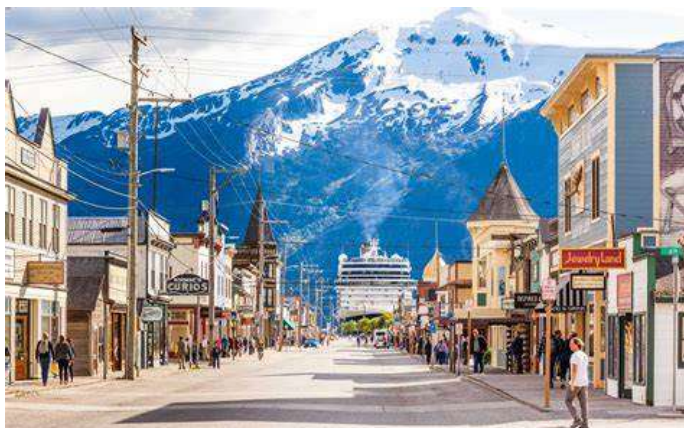

500 SOLDIERS ILL AT SHERIDAN LOCAL DOCTORS ASK AID

NICOLE E RICE DEDMAN

A survivor from day one, Nicole was born weighing one pound 13 ounces, in Sheridan, Wyoming to Earl Clayton Rice and Winifred Etta Reinhart Rice. She passed away, at the age of 78, from congestive heart failure and COPD in Salida, Colorado on July 21, 2021 at Heart of the Rockies Medical Center. Around 1945 the family moved from Sheridan to Billings. When she was 10 years old (1953), Nicole contracted a very rare disease called Leptospirosis Meningitis. After lengthy treatments and hospital care, the doctors could do nothing more for her and, basically, sent her home to die. Her family attended the First Church of God for many years in Billings. They called the Ministerial Assn of Billings to gather to pray for her, which they did, and she miraculously grew better and survived another 70 years. Nicole attended Billings's public schools through to graduation from Billings Senior High School in 1961. Following graduation Nicole married Roy Schneckloth and their daughter Kelly Rene' was born in Billings in 1962. They later moved to Great Falls Montana and in 1964 their daughter Leslie Michelle was born there. Roy Schneckloth and Nicole divorced in 1965. In the early 70's, she married Ron Hanson and the family moved to Colorado. They were together about five years before divorcing.



Nicole became a single mom, raising two girls for many years. She was a hardworking mother with an amazing work ethic, sometimes working 2 or more jobs at a time to keep her little family together. She loved cooking and baking. Golden tea buns were a special treat made for the girls. She loved celebrating the girls' birthdays and would go all out to make them memorable by often visiting special sites and places to dine.

In the early 80's Nicole returned to Billings to help care for her mother. There she reunited with an old friend, Roy Dedman. They married not too long after and moved to Buena Vista, Colorado where they resided until his death in 2016. Shortly after his death, she moved to Salida Colorado where she lived until her death in 2021.

In her young adult years, Nicole played Canasta with her mother for hours on end. She was very active and loved bowling, dancing, boat cruises to foreign countries, playing Bingo (with numerous cards at a time) with the gals at the Club. In her later years, she became progressively ill and inactive physically; but she constantly challenged her mental abilities by doing crossword puzzles, playing Dominoes any time she could nab a willing participant, crocheting dish cloths and afghans to give away and visiting on the phone with her friends.

Nicole would tell you that her proudest accomplishments were being a devoted wife and loving mother, and maintaining lifetime friendships. Her loyalty to others was a special gift. An outstanding attribute from her niece Mandi was that she spoke her mind, but "Aunt Nicki was REAL!" Her personality was big. She was competitive in sports and games. Some of her cousins

said "she had a wonderful laugh, wonderful wit, and bright mind!" Yes, Nicole would lighten up any party!

Nicole's presence will be missed by so many who loved her and have shared her unique journey through life, including "Fred" aka "Lord Kitty Kat".
