ANY MOFF FA DODMAN

We took the back road to Hamilton Place Mall in Chattanooga the other day and boy, did that bring back memories. We went through Graysville, Georgia on the way to the mall. That was one of the places where I lived as a young boy.

We moved to Graysville when I was around four or five years old. I do know that I started to school there. Back then, believe it or not, you started to school in the first grade. We never heard of pre-school or pre-K, etc. Dad was drafted into the army near the end of WW II, so when it came time for me to go to school, mom was not able to take me as she did not drive. Also, there were three other younger kids at home. Bill was yet to be born.

So when the big day arrived, mom pinned my name on my shirt and sent me down the road to school. It was probably less than a mile and was near the church that we walked to each Sunday. I was frightened and stood out in the school yard crying until the principal came out and took me to my class room. Once in the room, I was among some familiar faces. My Dickson cousins lived near us and several of them were in the same room There were only three rooms and three grades to a room.

I had already learned to read before starting to school so I was soon promoted to the second grade. but of course it was the same room. When we moved shortly thereafter to the Rossville area, I transferred to Osburn Elementary and was put back in the first grade (where I belonged). I have often said the first grade was the happiest three years of my life.

When we first moved to Graysville, I was not able to "talk plain" and some of my words were not easily understood. The Post Office was about a block away from the house and I would often go for our mail. The folks working there knew me, but would not give the mail to me until I asked for it. Mom said it sounded like I was saying, "any moff fa Dodman". However, they knew it meant, "any mail for Dedmon".

We found the "great big house" and the "big yard" with the "big cedar tree" in the corner. I don't know what happened to it, but it had shrunk in the past 60 years. Nothing was as large as I remembered it. The four of us (Carolyn, Ruth, Tommy and myself) spent many hours playing Carolyn and Alma Ruth. in that "ole" cedar tree. Tom was a baby and not Also, there was a cemetery in the picture.

next to us and if we got real brave, we might make a quick run through it. Although that didn't happen very often.

Dad left for the army on my birthday, June 27, 1945. The same day his father, Judson Dedmon, was hit by a truck and died two days later. We had to get "Uncle Alex" Dickson to drive us to Macon, Georgia to



pick up dad and bring him home. He was able to stay a few days after the funeral before returning to duty. "Uncle Alex" was actually mom's first cousin, but he seemed like an uncle, so we called him uncle, after all, his kids were cousins. We didn't

know the difference between first, second and third cousins in those days. The war ended soon after and Dad was discharged. They used to say with four kids at home the Army was paying mom more that it was paying dad.

After dad came home we bought our first house and moved to East Garden Farm Road near Rossville, Georgia. Prior to that we had lived in about five different houses, but they were either rental houses or one of the houses on the home place, near where I am now living. I remember tearing down one of the houses in which we lived. It was between where I am now living and my grandmother's house. We have a barn near the spot where it stood. I lived on East Garden until after Jane and I married in 1959. At first we made an apartment out of the garage behind the house, but only lived there about three months and moved to Huntsville, Alabama. That's another story for another day.

Since this is an inquiry that I was unable to connect to the "tree", I decided to use it in the BRICK WALL column. I am sure with just a little more information we can make the connection. Here is my reply:

Trista, Thanks for your inquiry... In order to make the connection, I will need to go a generation or two beyond your grandfather.... Is there anyone who may have some info on this.

For your information, Thomas is a very popular name in the Dedmon family. My grandfather was Thomas Judson and my brother is Thomas Gordon.

In the D E D M O N spelling we have record of 16 wearing the name Thomas. In the other variations we have 7- Thomas Dedman, 9- Thomas Deadman (our original spelling) 4- Dedmond and 2- Deadmond. Of course all of these are kinsman. While I believe all of us are related, there are two main lines of the Deadman lineage. One, which is my line, comes from Charles Deadman. The other is from the Christopher Deadman lineage. Both families came from England (Suffolk area). We have no info on Christopher's parents. I believe if we find them, they will connect to the Charles line... There are a few other "dead-ends" but these are the main two....

We had relatives who came from North Carolina to Georgia and then on to Arkansas. From there they dispersed to Oklahoma, Texas and California and parts beyond. I hope you have been able to read some of my Family Newsletters that are online at Dedmon.org. I will add your inquiry to the next issue....

EDWARDSVILLE - Johnny Rockets may soon have an Edwardsville location.

Johnny Rockets' corporate officials have approved a site at University Pointe II, a 56,000-square-foot strip mall that



opened earlier this year off Illinois 157 at 1053 Century Drive. **Susie Dedmon** is negotiating a lease for the spot, which will be her second franchise of the '50s-themed diner.

Dedmon on Nov. 7, 2003, opened her first Johnny Rockets at 3320 Green Mount Crossing Drive in Shiloh. She said she hopes to finalize a lease with the Edwardsville shopping center owner, RLP Development, within the next four months. "We're very serious about the location at University Pointe II," said **Dedmon**, who also said the city's expanding development and growing population enticed her to select the 2,600-square-foot spot at the shopping center. "I like it because it's kind of open to the high school and the college, since we're such a family-oriented restaurant. I think it lends itself to the neighborhood."

Pending approval, the metro-east's second Johnny Rockets restaurant could open within the next six months, **Dedmon** said. As part of her franchise-area development agreement with the Aliso Viejo, California based chain, **Dedmon** has agreed to open four franchises. She plans to open another one in St. Clair County and one in south St. Louis County. She would not say exactly where or when the final two restaurants will open.

Johnny Rockets in Shiloh has recently expanded its service and menu to include breakfast on Saturdays and Sundays, which **Dedmon** said will also be included at the new Edwardsville restaurant. The breakfast menu includes buttermilk pancakes, ham, bacon and potatoes.

"It's gone extremely well," she said of the weekend breakfast menu at the Shiloh restaurant. "We've had an overwhelming response from the market."

Breakfast at Johnny Rockets is served from 7:30-10:30 a.m. on Saturdays and 7:30-11 a.m. on Sundays.


